This concentration underscores the strategic vulnerability embedded in modern mobility: nations reliant on imported fluid systems face supply chain exposure, particularly amid geopolitical tensions and trade restrictions. The geopolitical dimension intensifies when considering regulatory landscapes. The European Union's REACH legislation, for instance, has reshaped fluid chemistry, phasing out DEG in favor of safer, more environmentally compliant base oils. This shift, driven by environmental policy, cascades into manufacturing practices and global trade flows. In contrast, North America and parts of Southeast Asia retain broader use of DEG-based fluids due to cost efficiency and established infrastructure. Meanwhile, emerging markets in Africa and Latin America often import second-tier fluids, where lower quality control increases risks of contamination and corrosion—issues that compound mechanical wear and reduce vehicle lifespan.
