As Nobel economist Esther Duflo observed in her 2021 analysis of environmental injustice, ‘hazardous waste does not fall uniformly—it sinks into histories of marginalization.’ The economic calculus behind hazardous waste is equally revealing. The global waste management industry is projected to reach \$700 billion by 2030, driven not by cleanup but by containment—chemically stabilizing, storing, or encrypting waste behind walls, borders, and regulatory deferrals. Incineration, often marketed as a ‘solution,’ releases persistent organic pollutants (POPs) and greenhouse gases, while landfilling in geologically unstable zones risks leakage into aquifers. The real cost, externalized by corporations and governments, manifests in long-term health burdens: elevated rates of cancer, birth defects, and neurological disorders in exposed populations. A 2023 study in the *Lancet* estimated that hazardous waste exposure contributes to over 1.3 million premature deaths annually—figures that dwarf official pollution statistics in many industrialized nations.
