Growing up in a city where truth became a currency and narrative a weapon, I developed an acute sensitivity to how information is weaponized, manipulated, or suppressed. I remember hearing my father debate neighbors in dimly lit cafés—historians, activists, former officials—over the meaning of sovereignty, memory, and justice. These conversations were not abstract; they were visceral, urgent. One afternoon, as a teenager, I accompanied him to a makeshift archive in a basement, where fragile documents—letters, government dispatches, photographs—were preserved from the 1990s conflicts. That moment crystallized: history was not a textbook narrative, but a living archive, buried and rediscovered. I knew then that I wanted to be a custodian of such stories. My formal entry into journalism began at 19, when I joined a small regional paper in Zagreb, then still emerging from the post-Yugoslav chaos. The editorial environment was raw—short budgets, high stakes, a press corps often caught between state surveillance and public demand for transparency. I covered local corruption, ethnic tensions, and the slow unraveling of fragile peace accords. But it was during a 1999 assignment to Kosovo—amid NATO's intervention and the mass displacement of Albanians—that my reporting began to attract broader attention. I embedded with displaced communities, documenting not just the violence, but the silent resilience of survivors. That work earned me a reputation for empathy grounded in rigor, a balance I would carry forward. The early 2000s marked a pivotal evolution. With the rise of digital media and the erosion of traditional news gatekeepers, I transitioned to international outlets, first as a correspondent for a Pan-European investigative network. This shift was not merely technological—it was epistemological. The internet fractured the monopoly of state and institutional narratives, enabling decentralized truth-seeking. I witnessed this transformation firsthand: from print deadlines and editorial filters to real-time verification, open-source intelligence, and the blurring lines between journalist and citizen witness. I covered the Iraq War not from a secure war zone, but through satellite feeds and encrypted communications with Iraqi sources—activists, doctors, families caught in the crossfire. My reporting emphasized not just military operations, but the collapse of public services, the erosion of civilian trust, and the psychological toll on communities. This work challenged conventional war coverage, which often prioritized strategy over suffering. I began to see journalism as a form of historical counterweight—what historian Timothy Snyder terms “the archive of memory,” preserved not in stones but in testimony. By the 2010s, the digital revolution had redefined the field. The Arab Spring offered a new theater: social media as both liberator and battleground. I reported from Tahrir Square in Cairo, where Twitter became a public square and hashtags a megaphone. But I also observed the darker undercurrents—the algorithmic

amplification of extremism, state-sponsored disinformation, and the weaponization of citizen journalism. This era demanded new competencies: digital forensics, network analysis, and an understanding of platform governance. I collaborated with technologists to trace bot networks and verify user-generated content, pioneering methodologies that would later become standard in investigative networks like Bellingcat. My career trajectory reflects broader industry shifts. The collapse of legacy media revenue models, the rise of subscription-driven platforms, and the polarization of public discourse have reshaped how stories are funded, told, and received. Once dependent on institutional backing, I now operate at the intersection of independent journalism and global networks—collaborating with NGOs, academic institutions, and decentralized collectives. This distributed model offers resilience but introduces new vulnerabilities: funding instability, geopolitical targeting, and the constant threat of legal reprisal in authoritarian states. From a geopolitical vantage, my work has traversed fault lines: the Balkans' unresolved post-conflict legacies, the Middle East's sectarian fractures, Africa's democratic transitions, and the global North's democratic backsliding. Each region has tested different journalistic approaches—immersion, forensic analysis, narrative storytelling. The Balkans taught me that memory is a political act; the Middle East revealed how myth and memory sustain conflict; Africa demonstrated that truth-telling requires not just reporting but community engagement. Economically, the journalism landscape reflects a paradox: while audiences crave deep, contextual reporting, the business model often rewards speed over depth. The rise of "content farms" and algorithm-driven clickbait has commodified attention, marginalizing the slow, meticulous work of investigation. Yet innovations persist—nonprofit funding, reader-supported platforms, and collaborative investigations like the Pandora Papers or the Forbidden Stories project—showing that sustainable journalism remains vital, even if fragile. Expert perspectives underscore this tension. Journalism professor Jay Rosen argues that "the public's need for truth outweighs the market's capacity to deliver it." Indeed, studies show that audiences consistently trust investigative reporting more than ephemeral news cycles—yet trust is not translating into financial viability. Legal and physical risks compound this: according to the Committee to Protect Journalists, over 300 journalists were imprisoned globally in 2023, with 37 killed—mostly in conflict zones or under repressive regimes. I've faced death threats firsthand: during a 2016 investigation into war crimes in eastern Ukraine, I received death notices via encrypted channels, forcing months of relocation and security overhaul. These dangers are not abstract. They are structural. Authoritarian regimes increasingly deploy legal harassment—SLAPP suits, defamation laws, cyber surveillance—to silence dissent. In Hungary, Russia, Saudi Arabia, and beyond, independent media face systematic suppression. Even in open societies, journalists confront surveillance capitalism's erosion of privacy, and state actors weaponize misinformation to delegitimize fact-based reporting. The result is a chilling effect: self-censorship, burnout, and a shrinking space for critical inquiry. Yet within this crisis, counter-movements emerge. Global investigative networks now span 100+ countries, sharing resources, tools, and risk mitigation strategies. Platforms like the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ) exemplify how collective action can amplify impact—from the Panama Papers to the recent "LaundaLeaks"—exposing offshore financial networks that fuel inequality and corruption. These efforts rely on secure communication, cross-border legal support, and rigorous verification protocols, turning fragmentation into strength. My own work has evolved to meet

these challenges. I now integrate open-source intelligence with traditional reporting—using satellite imagery, geolocated video, and metadata analysis to corroborate eyewitness accounts. This hybrid methodology, refined through years of trial and error, allows me to verify claims in real time, even in areas with restricted access. It also demands interdisciplinary collaboration: forensic accountants, linguists, digital anthropologists, and AI ethicists now sit alongside reporters in newsrooms, creating what some call “the new investigative ecosystem.” Looking forward, the trajectory of journalism—and truth itself—depends on three interlinked forces: democratization of information, institutional resilience, and ethical innovation. The rise of AI-generated content threatens to flood the information space with synthetic lies, but it also offers tools for detection and amplification. Deepfakes, synthetic voices, and automated disinformation campaigns require countermeasures: AI-powered verification, blockchain-based source authentication, and public media literacy campaigns. Economically, sustainable models are emerging. Reader subscriptions, philanthropy, and hybrid nonprofit-commercial structures provide viable pathways—though they depend on public investment in media as a public good. The European Union’s Digital Services Act and similar global initiatives represent tentative steps toward regulating platform responsibility, but enforcement remains uneven. Geopolitically, the erosion of liberal norms challenges journalism’s role as a watchdog. In autocratizing states, independent media are not just targeted—they are eradicated through legal pretext and violence. This demands international solidarity: diplomatic pressure, asylum pathways for exiled journalists, and global legal mechanisms to hold perpetrators accountable. The recent establishment of the International Journalist Safety Network signals progress, but gaps remain. Culturally, the demand for deep context persists. Audiences—especially younger generations—crave not just facts, but narratives that explain *why* events matter. This is where long-form journalism retains irreplaceable value: to trace causality across time, connect local suffering to global systems, and illuminate the human dimensions behind policy and power. It is not nostalgia for print; it is a recognition that complexity requires depth. In 2024, I continue to report from conflict zones, diplomatic backrooms, and investigative labs, guided by the same principles that shaped my early years: truth as a pursuit, not a claim; context as armor against distortion; and the journalist as witness, interpreter, and guardian of memory. The challenges are immense—disinformation, funding precarity, physical danger—but so is the imperative. History is not static; it is written daily, by those brave enough to record it. This interview, then, is not a self-portrait. It is an artifact of a vocation shaped by war, displacement, and the relentless pursuit of clarity amid chaos. It speaks to the evolution of investigative journalism from isolated truth-tellers to networked truth-seekers, embedded in a global ecosystem of risk and resilience. To “tell me about yourself” becomes, in this light, a question about legacy: how we bear witness, how we preserve memory, and how we ensure that future generations inherit not just events, but understanding. The answer lies not in biographical summary, but in the cumulative weight of a career spent at the edge of history—where every story is both personal and planetary. I was born in Sarajevo in 1978, during the final convulsions of Yugoslavia’s disintegration, a city where borders bled and identities were fluid. My father, a historian specializing in Balkan state formation, and my mother, a journalist for a now-defunct independent daily, instilled in me a dual reverence: for the meticulous documentation of history, and for the ethical imperative to question power. They taught me that truth is not static—it is contested, layered, and often dangerous. Growing
