roots and rejected colonial mimicry. The Catrina, once a mock of European aspiration, was reclaimed as a symbol of cultural authenticity. By the 1920s, muralists such as Diego Rivera elevated her image in public art, embedding her in grand frescoes that celebrated Mexico's mixed heritage. Rivera's **Sueño de una Tarde Dominical en la Alameda Central** (1947) features La Catrina among pre-Hispanic deities and revolutionary figures, framing her not as an outsider but as a vital thread in the nation's tapestry.

This reclamation was not spontaneous but strategically cultivated by post-revolutionary state institutions. The Ministry of Education, under José Vasconcelos, promoted a mestizo nationalism that sought to unify a fractured populace through shared symbols. La Catrina, stripped of her original satirical edge, became a palatable icon—elegant, dignified, and unthreatening. Her European garb was recast as a testament to cultural synthesis rather than mimicry, aligning with Vasconcelos' **La Raza Cósmica** ideology: the idea that Mexico's future lay in the fusion of indigenous and European bloodlines. In schools, textbooks, and public monuments, she symbolized a dignified past and a hopeful, inclusive future.
