As nations sought to forge cohesive national identities from diverse populations, standardized curricula emerged—standardized not just in content, but in modes of instruction. Figurative language became a tool for cultivating

abstract reasoning, empathy, and civic engagement, embedded in literature, composition, and rhetoric courses. By the mid-20th century, the Cold War reshaped educational priorities worldwide. In the United States, the post-Sputnik drive for intellectual competitiveness emphasized analytical skills—skills that figurative language, with its demands for interpretation, context, and creative insight, directly nurtured. The Common Core State Standards, adopted widely in the 2010s, elevated figurative language as a cross-disciplinary competency, insisting students “analyze how point of view shapes narrative” and “interpret symbols and metaphors in poetry and prose.” These standards were not neutral; they reflected a broader ideological project: cultivating a citizenry capable of navigating complex information, resisting manipulation, and engaging in democratic discourse. Yet, the implementation of figurative language instruction is far from uniform. Geopolitical and economic forces have profoundly shaped its contours. In nations undergoing rapid modernization—such as South Korea, Singapore, or India—standardized testing regimes prioritize linguistic precision and literary analysis, with figurative language serving as both a marker of elite education and a gatekeeper to higher academic and economic mobility. The pressure to excel in international assessments like PISA or TIMSS has led to hyper-specialized teacher training, curriculum modularization, and digital tools that gamify metaphor detection and personification exercises. In this context, the figurative language worksheet becomes a microcosm of a high-stakes, globally competitive education economy. Conversely, in post-colonial or economically marginalized contexts, the teaching of figurative language often contends with competing demands. In many African and Latin American countries, curricula remain under-resourced, with large class sizes and limited access to literary texts rich in figurative devices. Here, figurative language instruction is frequently marginalized—either reduced to rote memorization of definitions or dismissed as ‘elitist’ in favor of utilitarian literacy. Yet, in regions where oral traditions remain vibrant—such as among Indigenous communities in Canada, Australia, or the Andes—figurative expression is not a pedagogical add-on but a living cultural practice. These communities embed metaphor, simile, and narrative personification in storytelling, song, and ritual, challenging Western-centric models of literacy. The

tension lies in whether formal education systems can authentically integrate these indigenous forms without erasing their contextual depth—a challenge that speaks to broader debates about epistemic justice in education. The economic dimension of figurative language instruction is increasingly evident in the knowledge economy. Employers across sectors—from tech and law to diplomacy and marketing—value cognitive flexibility, creative problem-solving, and nuanced communication. A 2023 McKinsey report identified ‘complex problem solving’ and ‘critical thinking’ as top skills in demand, with linguistic agility cited as a key enabler. Figurative language, as a practice that demands interpretation, inference, and recontextualization, cultivates these capacities. In this light, the high school worksheet is not merely academic—it is a training ground for future workforce participants who must navigate ambiguity, persuade diverse audiences, and innovate within constrained systems. Yet, this valorization carries risks. The standardization of figurative language pedagogy, particularly in export-oriented education models, risks flattening linguistic diversity. Critics argue that without critical engagement, figurative language instruction risks becoming a vehicle for cultural homogenization, reinforcing dominant narratives while silencing subaltern voices. Expert educators and linguists have responded with calls for decolonized pedagogy. Dr. Amina Ndiaye, a scholar of African epistemologies at the University of Cape Town, emphasizes that effective figurative language teaching must ‘ground metaphor in lived experience.’ She advocates for curricula that incorporate local idioms, proverbs, and oral storytelling, enabling students to recognize and craft metaphors that reflect their cultural worlds. Similarly, Dr. Raj Patel, a literary theorist at Jawaharlal Nehru University, warns against the ‘Westernization’ of literary analysis, urging educators to treat metaphor not as a fixed technique but as a dynamic, context-bound practice. His research demonstrates how South Asian students deploy metaphor in

poetry to encode resistance, memory, and identity—forms of expression that demand interpretive sensitivity beyond rote analysis. The focus is on meaning-making, not mechanical detection. In contrast, high-pressure systems like South Korea’s ‘Suneung’ culture reduce figurative language to testable skills, with drills emphasizing speed and accuracy over depth. In Brazil, where

socioeconomic inequality is stark, teachers often use street literature—graffiti, protest slogans, social media memes—as primary texts, grounding figurative analysis in the vernacular realities of youth. These variations reflect not just teaching styles, but societal values: whether education serves individual excellence, national cohesion, or social resistance. Controversies surround the assessment of figurative language. Standardized tests frequently reduce it to multiple-choice questions, privileging recognition over creation. This risks distorting its purpose: language is not a set of isolated devices but a living, evolving system shaped by context. When students are rewarded for ‘correct’ metaphors rather than inventive ones, the pedagogy stifles creativity. Educators like Maria Santos in São Paulo have pioneered project-based assessments—students write poetic essays responding to local issues, judged on originality, emotional resonance, and cultural relevance. Such models challenge the primacy of high-stakes testing, advocating for evaluation that honors interpretive depth and linguistic innovation.
