Bill and later the Cold War imperative to arm allies and proxy forces, institutionalized arms transfers as a tool of foreign policy. Gun sellers—initially private contractors and arms dealers—became intermediaries between defense industries and foreign governments,

warlords, and insurgent groups. By the 1970s and 1980s, the rise of civil conflicts in Central America, Africa, and Southeast Asia transformed gun selling from a diplomatic instrument into an economic engine. Firms like Military Armament Corporation (MAC), founded by figures such as Edward “Ted” Kallestad, pioneered the model: sourcing military surplus, modifying or rebranding weapons, and distributing them through opaque networks that blurred legal and illegal channels. The Reagan administration’s support for anti-communist rebels—from the Contras in Nicaragua to UNITA in Angola—accelerated this shift, embedding gun sellers within state-sponsored proxy warfare. What began as state-to-state arms flows evolved into a privatized, globalized industry. Gun sellers no longer just delivered weapons; they curated supply chains, managed logistics across borders, and navigated shifting regulatory regimes. Yet its export policies—governed by the Arms Export Control Act—often prioritize strategic allies over human rights, enabling weapons to reach authoritarian regimes or conflict zones. This duality—legal domestic sales feeding global instability—exposes the contradictions in national arms export doctrines. In Africa, the gun seller's role is particularly acute. Post-colonial states with weak institutions struggle to control weapons flows, with arms often sourced from European, Russian, or Chinese suppliers, then diverted to insurgencies or criminal networks. In the Sahel, jihadist groups have exploited regional arms trade gaps, enabled by gun sellers who exploit corruption, underfunded border controls, and demand from local warlords. The result is a self-sustaining cycle: conflict generates demand, gun sellers supply, and instability deepens—each feeding the other.

The global arms trade, valued at over \$100 billion annually, is a major economic force, with gun sellers embedded in a multi-layered supply chain. At its core, the industry supports millions of jobs—from manufacturing and logistics to sales and regulatory compliance. This opacity enables money laundering, corruption, and the laundering of illicit proceeds, turning arms sales into vectors of financial crime. His admission underscores the moral ambiguity that defines the profession. Human rights advocates, such as Sarah Chen of Amnesty International, warn: 'The gun seller's role is not neutral.
