In Japan, **kaidan** (ghost stories) have long informed children's narratives, blending folklore with psychological depth—focusing on spiritual unease rather than bodily horror. In Latin America, stories often integrate collective memory of violence and displacement, using magical realism to process historical trauma in age-appropriate ways.
