At first glance, *Miranda*'s 1966 Supreme Court ruling—mandating that individuals in custody be informed of their rights—seems a discrete legal doctrine, confined to criminal procedure. But its enduring legacy lies not only in courtroom rulings, but in how it has been taught, contested, and reimagined across generations—particularly through institutions like ICivics, a nonprofit founded in 2005 to reinvigorate civic education. This article traces the deep historical roots, geopolitical and economic forces shaping their relationship, the industry-wide transformations they've driven, expert critiques, global parallels, and the long-term implications of their evolving synergy. *Miranda* did not emerge in isolation.
