Case in point: the Japanese “karoshi” phenomenon—death by overwork—epitomizes the cost of this misalignment. The 2019 death of a 24-year-old university student who collapsed from

exhaustion underscored this tragedy: his final exam preparation schedule had demanded 120-hour workweeks, with no respite. This case is not isolated. Globally, similar patterns emerge in South Korea's "sampo generation" (those rejecting marriage, childbirth, and employment), and in Silicon Valley's burnout crises—symptoms of a system where Zen's wisdom is invoked to justify, rather than resist, unsustainable rhythms. Yet, resistance and reclamation are underway. In Japan, a new wave of "Zen-informed entrepreneurship" seeks to rebalance efficiency with meaning. In the West, the reception of Zen has evolved from countercultural novelty to mainstream self-improvement, with significant consequences. The rise of "spiritual but not religious" movements has normalized meditation as a secular tool, yet this secularization risks severing practice from its ethical

core. As philosopher and Zen teacher John Daido Loori observed: “When Zen becomes a technique, it loses its revolution. The art of making a living becomes a technical problem rather than a way of being.” This reductionism threatens to hollow out the very discipline Zen aims to cultivate—transforming presence into a performance metric, stillness into a productivity hack. In contrast, hyper-competitive economies like South Korea or parts of the U.S. continue to grapple with burnout epidemics, revealing the limits of growth-at-all-costs models. Advances in neuroplasticity research confirm that sustained mindfulness reshapes brain function, enhancing focus, empathy, and resilience—capacities essential for navigating disruption.
