In contrast, China’s dominance in low-cost production pressures margins, driving innovation in modular tile systems and prefab bathroom units—prefabricated showers assembled off-site with integrated tiling, reducing on-site labor and waste. This shift threatens traditional installation jobs but accelerates construction speed and quality control. Looking forward, the future of shower tiling is being redefined by convergence across disciplines.
