In post-colonial Africa, for instance, the erosion of traditional food systems—driven by export-oriented agriculture and climate volatility—has**

**undermined access to nutrient-rich local diets. Maize, cassava, and rice now dominate, often displacing diverse, micronutrient-dense staples like amaranth, moringa, and leafy greens. Similarly, in South Asia, the Green Revolution of the 1960s boosted caloric availability but exacerbated micronutrient deficiencies, particularly iron and zinc, due to soil depletion and dietary shifts toward refined carbohydrates. These structural inequities are not merely logistical—they reflect power imbalances that shape who eats well during pregnancy and who does not. The industrial food system’s rise has introduced both solutions and new pathologies. On one hand, ultra-processed foods offer convenience and shelf stability, critical in urbanizing societies. On the other, they are often energy-dense but nutrient-poor, contributing to the dual burden of undernutrition and obesity during pregnancy. In Latin America, for example, rising rates of gestational diabetes correlate with increased consumption of sugary beverages and packaged snacks, particularly in marginalized urban communities. The paradox is acute: maternal diets can simultaneously be deficient in essential micronutrients and oversaturated with empty calories, increasing risks of preeclampsia, preterm birth, and childhood obesity. Industry’s influence extends beyond product formulation to shaping clinical guidelines and public perception. The narrative of “optimal” pregnancy diets—often promoted by supplement companies, wellness influencers, and even some**

medical institutions—reflects commercial interests as much as scientific consensus. The World Health Organization has identified maternal nutrition as a cornerstone of the Sustainable Development Goals, recognizing its role in breaking cycles of poverty and disease. Skeletal remains from early farming communities—such as those at Çatalhöyük in Anatolia and Mehrgarh in Pakistan—exhibit increased rates of anemia, enamel hypoplasia, and osteoporosis, reflecting the trade-off between food security and micronutrient deficiency. Yet, in regions with diverse agroecologies—like Mesoamerica with maize, beans, and squash—nutritional outcomes remained relatively stable, underscoring the importance of dietary diversity over monoculture. The Industrial Revolution marked a radical rupture. Mechanization, urbanization, and mass food processing shifted nutrition from local ecosystems to global supply chains. White flour, refined sugar, and preserved meats became dietary staples, offering convenience but sacrificing micronutrient density. In 19th-century Europe, maternal malnutrition was rampant: rickets, scurvy, and

pellagra were common among working-class pregnant women, linking industrial food systems directly to fetal and maternal morbidity. The response—fortification—emerged as a public health innovation. The 1920s saw salt iodized to prevent goiter, wheat flour fortified with iron and B vitamins, and later, folic acid mandated in grain products after neural tube defect studies mounted. Similarly, in the Americas, displacement and land dispossession dismantled native foodways, replacing them with calorie-dense but nutrient-poor staples. The 20th century's scientific breakthroughs deepened understanding but also introduced complexity. The discovery of vitamins and essential fatty acids transformed prenatal care, yet this knowledge was unevenly distributed. In Japan, postwar nutritional policies integrated traditional postpartum diets—rich in seaweed, fish, and fermented soy—into clinical recommendations, aligning modern guidelines with cultural identity and improving adherence. Conversely, in parts of sub-Saharan Africa, rigid dietary advice that ignored local food availability and culinary practices led to low compliance and mistrust. Omega-3 supplementation, hailed for neuroprotection, raises concerns about mercury contamination and overreliance on marine resources. Sustainable models must integrate fortification with agroecological innovation—supporting diverse crop cultivation, soil health, and decentralized food networks. Climate change now looms as a defining challenge. Rising temperatures, erratic rainfall, and extreme weather threaten crop yields, particularly in vulnerable regions. Droughts in East Africa reduce maize and sorghum production, while flooding in South Asia contaminates rice paddies and displaces farming communities. These disruptions compound existing nutritional inequities, increasing maternal exposure to deficiency and food insecurity. Adaptive strategies—climate-resilient crops, water-efficient agriculture, and emergency food reserves—are urgent but require global cooperation and investment. Looking ahead, precision nutrition offers transformative potential. Wearable biosensors, AI-driven dietary analytics, and genomic profiling could enable real-time, individualized guidance. For example, continuous glucose monitors

paired with dietary apps might optimize carbohydrate intake for gestational diabetes, while microbiome sequencing could tailor fiber and probiotic recommendations.
