The Interstate Medical Licensure Compact, approved by Michigan in 2019, allows pharmacists licensed in one state to apply for expedited licensure in others—facilitating workforce mobility but raising concerns about diluted oversight. Critics argue that streamlined access risks compromising

uniformity, particularly in states with weaker regulatory teeth. Conversely, proponents cite Michigan’s experience with cross-state compacts as a blueprint for resilience, balancing access with accountability through centralized background checks and real-time credential validation.

Industry Impact: Trust, Innovation, and the Cost of Regulation

The U.K. employs a centralized General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC) exam, combining theory, ethics, and practical assessments with continuous revalidation. In contrast, Michigan's model is distinctly decentralized yet state-coordinated, blending federal mandates with local licensing oversight.

What distinguishes Michigan is its granular focus on state-specific challenges. Unlike federal systems that prioritize uniformity, Michigan tailors its exam to regional health needs—incorporating rural pharmacy protocols, opioid response strategies, and culturally sensitive care frameworks. This hybrid approach offers a compelling case study: how a state-level examination can balance national compliance with localized resilience.

Emerging economies, particularly in Southeast Asia and Latin America, grapple with underdeveloped pharmacy regulation, where licensing often lacks rigor and enforcement is inconsistent. In these contexts, Michigan’s model—with its emphasis on science-based exams, continuous education, and technology integration—represents an aspirational benchmark.
