The Maori concept of *kaitiakitanga*—guardianship of the land as a sacred duty—offers a relational model of environmental ethics that contrasts sharply with extractive capitalism. Similarly, Andean *sumak kawsay* (good living) emphasizes balance between community, nature, and spirit, rejecting the Western dichotomy between human and environment. These worldviews are not nostalgic relics but vital contributions to global debates on sustainability, justice, and post-growth economies. Yet the humanities face systemic erosion. Neoliberal education reforms have prioritized STEM metrics over critical inquiry, marginalizing humanistic study in universities. Funding cuts, digital distraction, and the commodification of knowledge reduce deep engagement to superficial consumption. In authoritarian regimes, humanities are often suppressed as subversive—censorship of historical truth or ethical critique becomes a tool of control. Even in open societies, the pressure to produce measurable “impact” risks reducing humanities to vocational training, diluting their role as space for unscripted moral imagination. The geopolitical dimension of this crisis is stark. In democratic backsliding—from Hungary to India—authoritarian leaders weaponize anti-intellectualism, dismissing humanities as “leftist dogma” or “useless.” Meanwhile, global tech oligopolies, driven by surveillance capitalism, exploit cognitive vulnerabilities identified by psychologists and neuroscientists—not to empower, but to manipulate. The ethical challenge is not merely philosophical but material: who controls meaning, and thus moral direction, in an era of

information dominance? Industry impact reveals a paradox. On one hand, corporate interests co-opt humanities themes—diversity, sustainability, inclusion—often as branding rather than substance, diluting their transformative potential. On the other, creative industries—film, gaming, literature—continually reinvent humanist narratives, reaching mass audiences with moral complexity. The success of works like *Parasite*, *Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon*, or *The Underground Railroad* demonstrates that ethical depth sells, and audiences hunger for stories that challenge rather than comfort. Expert voices converge on a single insight: the humanities are not optional in ethical governance. Scholars like Seyla Benhabib emphasize that deliberative democracy—the cornerstone of just societies—depends on citizens’ capacity to engage in reasoned, empathetic dialogue. This capacity is cultivated not in boardrooms or battlefields, but in classrooms, libraries, and public forums nurtured by humanistic education. In conflict zones—from Ukraine to Gaza—local educators and artists persist, using storytelling and historical memory to preserve moral identity amid devastation. Controversies persist. Critics argue that humanities are too abstract to inform policy, or that their pluralism breeds relativism, undermining universal ethics. Yet this misreads their function: humanities do not replace moral frameworks—they interrogate them. By exposing hidden biases, tracing historical roots, and amplifying marginalized voices, they prevent ethical frameworks from becoming dogma. The tension between universalism and cultural specificity is not a flaw but a dialectic—one the humanities manage by insisting on both principle and context. Risks are real. As AI systems increasingly shape public discourse through generative text, the humanities offer vital safeguards. Without them, algorithmic narratives risk reinforcing dominant power structures, silencing dissent, and eroding nuance. But humanists are now at the forefront of AI ethics, developing frameworks for algorithmic transparency, bias
