Lee's decision to center a Black defendant's injustice, narrated by a white girl's moral awakening, was both innovative and subversive—challenging readers to see prejudice not as abstract ideology, but as lived experience. The work's initial reception—critically lauded, commercially moderate—belied its eventual transformation into a foundational text in American letters, a trajectory shaped by shifting cultural memes, educational adoption, and the enduring power of moral storytelling.
