Critics argued that his idealized bureaucracy overlooked power imbalances, racial and gender exclusions, and the ways administrative rationality could reinforce colonial domination. Postcolonial scholars later interrogated how Weberian models, exported uncritically, often undermined local governance traditions and entrenched bureaucratic elites in newly independent states. Despite these tensions, Weber's legacy endures in the DNA of modern public administration. His analytical rigor laid the foundation for systematic institutional analysis, influencing figures like Dwight Waldo, who expanded on bureaucracy's normative dimensions, and later New Public Management reformers who sought to inject market logic into public services. Yet Weber himself would likely caution against reducing bureaucracy to a mere tool for efficiency. For him, public administration was inseparable from ethics—bureaucrats bore a moral responsibility to serve the public interest, not just follow rules. This ethical imperative remains a vital but underemphasized strand in contemporary debates about accountability, transparency, and public trust. The evolution of Weber's ideas over the 20th century reflects the shifting terrain of governance. The mid-century welfare state expansions tested bureaucracy's capacity to deliver equity and responsiveness, revealing both its potential and its limits. The neoliberal turn of the 1980s and 1990s reinterpreted Weberian rationality through the lens of performance metrics, privatization, and decentralization—often prioritizing agility over stability. Today, in an era defined by digital transformation, global crises, and rising populism, Weber's framework offers enduring insights. His warning about bureaucratic autonomy, the danger of "red tape" divorced from purpose, and the need for administrative legitimacy resonates acutely. Contemporary public administrations face unprecedented risks: algorithmic bias in public decision-making, surveillance overreach under the guise of security, and the erosion of human judgment in automated systems. Weber's insistence on impersonal rules grounded in objective criteria gains renewed urgency amid these challenges. Yet his model also demands adaptation—his ideal-type cannot be mechanically applied to decentralized, networked, or participatory governance models. The rise of

digital bureaucracies, open data initiatives, and citizen engagement platforms suggests a reconfiguration of Weber’s legacy: from hierarchical control to adaptive, transparent, and inclusive administration. Expert perspectives diverge on the balance between Weber’s ideal and modern realities. Scholars like Mark Moore have extended his framework into strategic public leadership, emphasizing how bureaucratic cultures shape policy outcomes. Conversely, critics like Birgitta Bertling stress that Weber underestimated the role of culture, emotion, and informal networks in bureaucratic practice—factors increasingly recognized in post-Weberian administrative theory. Globally, comparative studies reveal varied receptions: East Asian states like Japan and South Korea adopted Weberian rationality with notable success, integrating strong bureaucratic capacity with cultural norms of discipline. In contrast, many African and post-conflict states struggle with Weberian models due to weak institutional foundations, corruption, and limited trust in public authority—highlighting that administrative form alone cannot overcome structural fragility. The long-term implications of Weber’s thought hinge on how societies reconcile efficiency with equity, rationality with empathy, and institutional stability with democratic renewal. His work reminds us that bureaucracy is not a natural or static entity, but a historically contingent institution shaped by power, values, and purpose. As public administration evolves in response to climate change, AI, and global inequality, Weber’s enduring contribution lies in his insistence on critical self-awareness: that the machinery of governance must remain accountable, reflective, and ultimately accountable to the people it serves. In sum, Max Weber’s engagement with public administration transcended disciplinary boundaries. He transformed sociology into a tool for institutional diagnosis, offering a framework that remains indispensable for understanding—and improving—the engines of state action. His legacy is not a doctrine, but a continuous conversation: one that demands rigor, humility, and an unwavering commitment to the public good.
