, was not simply a manifesto; it was a theological reckoning. In that text, Cone declared: 'The Negro is not a footnote in the story of God but a central figure in the revelation of God's liberating presence.' This assertion was revolutionary. It rejected the Eurocentric theological canon that had long rendered Black suffering invisible or symbolic. Instead, Cone grounded theology in the skin, blood, and struggle of Black people. He reinterpreted Christ not as a distant, white, ascetic savior, but as a Black man crucified under a white supremacist state—his death and resurrection understood through the lens of Black martyrdom and resistance. This Christology was not metaphorical; it was existential. For Cone, to read Jesus through the eyes of the oppressed was to see theology as inherently political. Yet among marginalized communities—particularly in urban Black churches and student movements—Cone's words lit a flame. His insistence that God identified with the oppressed resonated with a generation that had seen civil rights victories hollowed by persistent poverty, police violence, and institutional neglect. His theology was seen as subversive not only by state institutions but by religious hierarchies invested in maintaining the status quo. Surveillance, marginalization, and professional exclusion were real threats. Yet Cone persisted, grounded in the belief that theology must speak where power silences. This commitment to prophetic witness—rooted in Black experience but resonant universally—has cemented his status as a moral and intellectual giant. As global movements for racial justice, climate justice, and anti-imperialism converge, his insight that oppression is systemic—and that theology must name and confront it—remains urgent. Young theologians now blend his Black-centered framework with eco-theology, queer liberation, and migrant justice, expanding its reach without diluting its core: that liberation is co-constituted. In the long arc of history, Cone's work endures not as a relic, but as a living tradition. It challenges each generation to ask: What does it mean to believe in a God who stands with the broken? How does faith become a force for dismantling empires of power? And what does it cost to live into a Christianity that refuses silence in

the face of injustice? Cone's answer, forged in the crucible of Black suffering and resistance, is clear: truth is not passive. It is revolutionary. It demands not just faith, but action. It demands that we see the divine not in abstractions, but in the faces of those who hunger, who are beaten, who are buried, who
