Yet, their model raises questions about fiduciary duty, data privacy, and the erosion of human judgment in high-stakes decisions. Between these poles exists a hybrid frontier. Firms like Charles

Schwab and Fidelity blend algorithmic tools with human advisors, offering “digital-first but human-backed” services. This convergence reflects a broader industry insight: clients demand both technological empowerment and expert guidance—especially during market turbulence. Africa presents a unique case. With large unbanked populations, mobile brokerage platforms like Nigeria's Opay and Kenya's Mono leverage USSD and SMS to deliver brokerage-like services—trading, savings, micro-investments—without traditional intermediaries. These platforms bypass legacy infrastructure, democratizing access but operating in regulatory gray zones. A global consensus on brokerage standards remains elusive. While international bodies like the IOSCO advocate for principles on transparency and investor protection, enforcement is inconsistent. The rise of decentralized finance (DeFi) and blockchain-based trading threatens to further fragment regulation, enabling peer-to-peer brokerage without intermediaries. Yet, volatility and fraud in unregulated DeFi platforms underscore the enduring need for trusted, accountable intermediaries. Experts project that the next decade will see gradual convergence—driven by cross-border regulatory cooperation, standardized disclosure protocols, and shared technology

platforms. The challenge lies in balancing innovation with consumer protection, ensuring that brokerage evolves without sacrificing the trust that underpins financial markets.
