The bucket list economy fuels job creation in travel, content creation, and event production, but also entrenches gig labor and precarious work. Platforms rely on user-generated content, incentivizing constant output over depth. Zackham analyzes how this dynamics reshape labor: influencers monetize authenticity, but rarely secure long-term stability. He contrasts this with European models, where public broadcasting and cultural funding support more reflective, less commercialized bucket-list narratives. Long-term implications point toward a redefinition of success and well-being. As automation and AI redefine work, the bucket list may evolve from a travel-focused project to a broader life-planning framework—encompassing personal growth, community contribution, and ecological stewardship. Zackham envisions a future where bucket lists are less about “checking off” and more about “deepening in”—a shift toward intentionality rooted in presence, connection, and sustainability.
