According to a 2023 report by Grand View Research, the global bioaesthetic tattoo market—driven heavily by cardiac-themed placements—was valued at \$1.8 billion and projected to grow at a 9.4% CAGR through 2030. This expansion is fueled not only by individual demand but by institutional partnerships: hospitals in Scandinavia now integrate heart tattoos into post-heart-attack rehabilitation programs, viewing them as long-term motivational tools.
