poised over a typewriter whose keys still bear the ghostly imprint of decades past. This is the world Rebecca West once inhabited—a world where war was not merely reported but dissected, where soldiers were not just subjects but symbols, and where the return of the soldier re-entered the national consciousness with profound consequence. The commodification of trauma—where personal suffering becomes marketable content—raises ethical questions about exploitation versus advocacy.
