This period was not merely repression; it was a geopolitical consolidation, where state and church collaborated to enforce orthodoxy and suppress dissent. Yet resistance persisted. In remote regions—Scotland’s Highlands, the Baltic forests, the Balkans—oral traditions survived. The **cailleach** of Gaelic lore, a hag embodying mountain and storm, endured as both feared and venerated figure. In Slavic lands, **leshny** and **domovoi** coexisted with Christian saints, illustrating syncretic resilience. Colonial expansion further reshaped witchcraft: in the Americas, enslaved Africans preserved Yoruba **babalawos** and **sangomas**, adapting rituals to new environments.
