Nunan’s advocacy for systematic, developmentally appropriate early ELT resonated deeply in these contexts, providing both theoretical legitimacy and practical tools for implementation. Yet Nunan’s approach was not without controversy. Critics within the ELT community, particularly proponents of more structured grammar-translation methods, argued that his emphasis on implicit learning risked insufficient attention to foundational grammar or literacy skills. Others, from postcolonial and critical pedagogy perspectives, questioned whether promoting English—even with progressive methodology—reinforced linguistic imperialism, subtly marginalizing local languages and epistemologies. Nunan acknowledged these tensions, advocating for a balanced, culturally responsive model that respected local identities while equipping learners with global competencies. His concept of “language zones”—recognizing regional linguistic repertoires as assets rather than liabilities—has informed policy in multilingual nations like Nigeria and Malaysia, where English coexists with indigenous languages in complex sociolinguistic ecosystems. Long-term implications of Nunan’s influence extend beyond classrooms into broader societal transformation. Nunan addresses this by promoting “English for use, not for dominance,” supporting policies that empower local educators to adapt curricula to community needs. His advocacy for teacher agency and contextualized instruction offers a practical antidote to top-down, homogenizing approaches.
