The economic context further shaped this evolution. The global gamification market, projected to exceed \$100 billion by 2027, includes a significant but under-recognized subset: serious games

designed for mental health and personal development. Venture capital began allocating resources to startups fusing behavioral science with immersive technology. Companies like Woebot and Superbet explored AI-driven companions that offer real-time affirmations, cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) prompts, and progress tracking—all wrapped in game mechanics. This industrial shift reflects a broader revaluation of digital wellness: from passive consumption to active psychological investment. Industry impact has been profound. Traditional game developers now routinely incorporate “well-being by design” principles, influenced by frameworks like the “Positive Games Framework” pioneered by researchers at the University of Oxford’s Oxford Internet Institute. This model emphasizes autonomy, competence, and relatedness—three pillars of intrinsic motivation identified in self-determination theory.
