Yet, the greatest risk lies not in viral mutation—yellow fever viruses exhibit low genetic variability—but in human systems. Political will, health equity, and international

solidarity determine whether yellow fever remains a manageable disease or resurges as a global threat. The history of yellow fever is a chronicle of resilience and fragility, a testament to how pathogens exploit the fault lines of society.
