In Africa, the Trans-Saharan trade transformed salt into a currency of empire. The Tuareg, master navigators of the Sahara, carried slabs of rock salt from the Taoudenni basin—up to 250 kilos per camel—across 1,000 kilometers of shifting dunes. These caravans sustained empires: the Ghana Empire taxed salt caravans, the Mali Empire monopolized production in the Taghaza mines, and Songhai used salt wealth to fund Timbuktu’s scholarly flourishing. In Asia, China’s Han Dynasty (206 BCE–220 CE) established state-run salt pans in Shandong, operating under strict imperial control. The

state patented salt production, using it to fund infrastructure and military campaigns. By the Tang Dynasty, salt trade networks stretched from the Pacific to Central Asia, with taxation records carved into stone stele revealing detailed yield and pricing—early examples of resource accounting. Each of these systems was territorial, bounded by physical geography and enforced by local authority. But the Industrial Revolution introduced a rupture. The discovery of synthetic ammonia via the Haber-Bosch process in 1909 decoupled agriculture from natural salt deposits, yet paradoxically increased reliance on brine. Salt, no longer scarce, remained essential—now embedded in chemical synthesis, refrigeration, and pharmaceuticals. Railroads and steamships expanded global salt trade, linking mines in the U.S. Permian to factories in Manchester and Shanghai. The 20th century saw salt's role morph under geopolitical pressure.
