Weber defended the transaction as necessary stewardship—funds enabled digitization of 12,000 pages of neglected sheet music from Eastern Europe, many rescued from private collections and forgotten synagogues. Additionally, the emotional weight of the violin’s name exposes it to exploitation—commodification by commercial brands, political manipulation in nationalist discourse, or even appropriation by non-Jewish institutions claiming stewardship over Jewish cultural memory. Weber’s foundation now employs a multidisciplinary advisory board, including Holocaust survivors, legal experts, and ethical philosophers, to navigate these tensions. Globally, comparisons reveal divergent approaches to memorializing cultural loss. In Japan, the **taiko** drum’s survival through WWII and its role in postwar community rebuilding parallels the violin’s symbolic endurance. In South Korea, the **gayageum**—a
