The royal court at Versailles elevated **bonjour** to a ceremonial code—timing its use by hour, position, and occasion. A noble’s morning **bonjour** to the king was not just courteous; it was a pledge of allegiance. This performative dimension persists today. In diplomatic missions across Paris, the precise delivery of **Bonjour, Monsieur/Madame**—paired with the subtle bow or curtsy—carries weight. It is not performative for show, but performative to signal legitimacy.
