This paradox underscored how humanitarian crises could momentarily override ideological divides. The concert's production required unprecedented synchronization: 90 minutes of live performance across four continents—London, Philadelphia, Dublin, Johannesburg, and Sydney—each venue feeding into a global feed. Delays, dropped feeds, and technical glitches were not anomalies but symptoms of a system stretched to its limits. The infamous moment when Led Zeppelin's Jimmy Page cut his guitar mid-set and the feed flickered was not just a production hiccup—it was a human testimony to the effort behind the illusion. Economically, Live Aid emerged from a paradox: massive corporate investment in music and media, yet underfunded humanitarian infrastructure. The concert raised an estimated £150 million (over £400 million today) for famine relief, funded through ticket sales, sponsorships (including Audi and Coca-Cola), and consumer donations triggered by televised appeals. Yet critics noted the irony: the very industries profiting from spectacle—advertising, cable, and record labels—were the same that commodified suffering into ratings. This tension foreshadowed future debates about “charity capitalism” and performative activism. The broadcast itself was a technical and artistic triumph. Over 1.9 billion viewers across 150 countries tuned in—a reach unmatched at the time. The format blended rock spectacle with documentary urgency: pyrotechnics, aerial shots of crowds, real-time footage of Ethiopian refugees, and

emotional testimonials from Aid workers. The inclusion of political figures—Queen Elizabeth II delivering a rare public address on Ethiopia, and U.S. President Ronald Reagan’s presence, symbolic of soft power—lent legitimacy. Yet Geldof’s insistence on unfiltered moments—children crying in camps, aid workers struggling with logistics—humanized the crisis beyond statistics. From a media studies perspective, Live Aid pioneered the “event-driven news cycle,” where live global performance became a form of real-time global citizenship. It demonstrated television’s power not just to inform, but to mobilize. It also exposed the limits of celebrity-led aid: while immediate relief was critical, structural causes—colonial legacies, unequal trade, weak governance—remained unaddressed. The Ethiopian famine’s root causes persisted, even as Live Aid’s legacy inspired future generations of activists to demand accountability, not just charity. In retrospect,
