Building on Bernays, James Grunig's Excellence Theory (1983) revolutionized the field by advocating two-way symmetrical communication as the gold standard. Grunig argued that organizations achieve legitimacy not through one-way persuasion but through mutual understanding with stakeholders. This model demands active listening, responsive dialogue, and shared value creation—principles increasingly codified in corporate communications protocols. Yet, while Grunig's framework laid a normative foundation, its implementation often falters under commercial pressures and short-term performance demands. Concurrently, the Situational Theory of Publics (O'Guinn & Kanuk, 1983) introduced a dynamic understanding of stakeholder engagement. It posits that publics emerge and evolve based on awareness, constraint, and involvement—shifting from non-public to aware, concerned, and active stages. This theory challenged static audience segmentation, urging communicators to tailor messages not only by demographic but by psychological and behavioral readiness. In practice, this means anticipating stakeholder transitions and preparing adaptive narratives that evolve with public sentiment. The rise of critical discourse analysis in the 1990s further deepened theoretical rigor, exposing how corporate language constructs reality and masks power asymmetries. Scholars like Norman Fairclough demonstrated that corporate discourse often naturalizes economic interests as objective fact—framing layoffs as “restructuring,” or tax avoidance as “strategic efficiency.” Such analyses revealed communication not as neutral conveyance but as ideological performance, prompting calls for critical media literacy and ethical transparency. More recently, networked communication theories—drawing from complexity science and sociology—emphasize the emergent, decentralized nature of information flow. In a world where social media algorithms amplify certain voices while silencing others, traditional top-down messaging has proven increasingly ineffective. Instead, resilience emerges from distributed networks of dialogue, where authenticity, consistency, and responsiveness build trust across fragmented audiences.
