Risks extend beyond light pollution and space debris. The psychological and cultural impact of an increasingly visible, yet commercially mediated sky demands scrutiny. As augmented reality and AI-driven sky apps overlay digital layers onto real stars, the raw experience of stargazing—intuitive, unmediated, deeply personal—may erode. There is a paradox: while technology expands access, it may also alienate users from the sky’s

By the 19th century, astronomy had become institutionalized. Observatories like Greenwich and Pulkovo were not just scientific outposts but symbols of national prestige. Precision timekeeping enabled global navigation, a prerequisite for empire and trade. The telescope’s invention turned the sky into a laboratory, revealing Jupiter’s moons and lunar topography—discoveries that challenged religious orthodoxy and redefined authority from divine revelation to empirical evidence. This era embedded astronomy in the fabric of modernity, making celestial observation both a public good and a national endeavor. The 20th century accelerated this transformation through geopolitical competition. The Space Race transformed the sky from a passive backdrop into an active frontier. Sputnik’s 1957 passage was not just a satellite launch; it was a declaration of technological sovereignty, triggering NASA’s creation and embedding space exploration in Cold War ideology. Satellites evolved from passive observers to critical infrastructure—enabling global communications, weather forecasting, and military surveillance. Astronomy became entangled with national security, a duality that persists today in the militarization of space and the rise of commercial satellite constellations.
