Postcolonial scholars warn of its appropriation—how Western elites often consume “mysticism” as an exotic spectacle, while marginalized traditions remain silenced. Feminist theologians note that the emphasis on impersonal unity can overlook the embodied, relational, and socially situated nature of spiritual experience. Economically, the perennial current intersects with emerging global trends. The rise of mindfulness, meditation, and integrative health reflects a market-driven embrace of inner transformation—often divorced from its philosophical roots. Tech giants and wellness industries monetize contemplative practices, raising questions about authenticity and commodification.
