This perspective aligns with postcolonial theory: myth is not a relic but a living framework for understanding power, gender, and memory. The song's geopolitical resonance is subtle but profound. In Greece, Homer remains a soft-power asset—promoted in EU cultural diplomacy as a unifying Mediterranean heritage. In Turkey, where Troy's archaeological site at Hisarlik is a national symbol, the **Iliad** is framed as indigenous, resisting Hellenic appropriation.
