To understand national parks is to trace the arc of humanity's relationship with the wild—how we have revered, exploited, and now, increasingly, reckon with the consequences of that relationship. The modern concept of national parks emerged in the late 19th century, born from a confluence of Romanticism, industrialization, and a nascent environmental consciousness. Yellowstone, established in 1872 as the world's first national park, was not merely a gesture of preservation but a calculated act of nation-building. At a time when the United States was expanding its territory across indigenous lands, the creation of Yellowstone served dual purposes: to protect a unique geothermal and ecological treasure and to assert federal sovereignty over a landscape that had become a contested frontier. The park's designation was as much about consolidating national identity as it was about conservation. As historian William Cronon argues, 'the national park was a theater where the state performed its

stewardship, reenacting ideals of wilderness as both sublime and civilized.’ This early model was deeply shaped by a specific cultural and geopolitical context. In post-Civil War America, the expansion of railroads enabled unprecedented access to remote regions, while industrialization accelerated the depletion of natural resources. The national park thus emerged as a counter-narrative: a curated wilderness preserved from exploitation, framed as a national patrimony. Yet this preservation was built on displacement. The establishment of Yellowstone excluded and criminalized the presence of Indigenous nations—Shoshone
