The emergence of the "colosseum bass" in prog-rock, such as in Genesis and Rush, demanded extended ranges and unconventional tunings, pushing scales beyond traditional pentatonic frameworks into modal jazz territory, with whole-tone, pentatonic minor with altered tones, and

even microtonal inflections. Contemporary bass guitar scales are thus a palimpsest of historical layers, economic pressures, and artistic rebellion. The dominant scale system remains rooted in the blues and pentatonic minor, reinforced by decades of pedagogical tradition and commercial pedagogy. Moreover, the global spread of bass education often privileges Western models, marginalizing indigenous sonic systems. This creates a paradox: while the bass unites musicians across cultures, its dominant pedagogical framework may suppress diversity. UNESCO’s recent initiative to document global bass traditions highlights this concern, advocating for curricula that honor regional scale systems as valid foundations for bass practice.
