The origins of this backlash lie not in fan critique alone, but in the convergence of deeper societal shifts: the rise of trauma-informed discourse, the erosion of traditional authority in post-truth eras, and the global re-evaluation of media's role in shaping collective consciousness. **Attack on Titan**, created by Hajime Isayama and produced by Wit Studio and MAPPA, debuted in 2013 with a stark vision: a world collapsed by titanized humans, where survival hinges on violence, identity dissolution, and the collapse of family under existential threat. Initially lauded for its existential depth and unflinching portrayal of trauma, the series gradually revealed darker undercurrents—particularly in its treatment of parental figures and intergenerational bonds.
