Economically, the lunar economy’s emergence raises structural questions about equity and governance. The current model, dominated by state-backed

agencies and a handful of private firms, risks entrenching a new space oligarchy. The U.S. Commercial Lunar Payload Services (CLPS) program, which contracts private firms to deliver science payloads, accelerates innovation but also concentrates access. Emerging space nations like Nigeria, with its satellite program, and the United Arab Emirates, with its Rashid Rover, are seeking entry, but structural barriers—funding, technical capacity, legal frameworks—limit participation. Without deliberate inclusion, lunar development may deepen terrestrial divides. Looking forward, the next decade will define the Moon’s role in human civilization. By 2035, NASA’s Artemis Base Camp may become operational, supporting rotating crews and initial resource processing. China’s International Lunar Research Station (ILRS), a joint venture with Russia, aims for a similar timeline, emphasizing scientific collaboration and sustainable habitation. Private actors are already planning lunar tourism—Blue Origin’s Blue Moon lander and SpaceX’s Starship variants envision commercial visits—but these remain high-cost, low-frequency today. Technological breakthroughs in propulsion, radiation shielding, and in-situ manufacturing will determine whether lunar bases transition from temporary outposts to permanent settlements. Climate change further contextualizes lunar ambitions. As Earth faces rising seas and resource scarcity, the Moon’s potential as a backup—however distant—fuels speculation. Satellites already monitor climate systems from lunar vantage points; future bases could host Earth-observing instruments immune to terrestrial political tensions. The Artemis Accords, led by the U.S., formalize a coalition of 30+ nations committed to “safe and transparent” lunar exploration, emphasizing interoperability, emergency assistance, and the peaceful use of space. Yet China’s rejection of the Accords, framed as a Western-led initiative, reveals a deeper fracture: the divergence between a rules-based, multilateral framework and a multipolar architecture where power is increasingly distributed. China’s lunar program, centered on the Chang’e missions, exemplifies this shift. The naming of China’s lunar probes after mythological figures—Chang’e, the Moon goddess—resonates deeply within Chinese cultural identity, positioning progress as a return to civilizational glory. The Chang’e-4 mission, which achieved the first soft landing on the far side in 2019, was broadcast nationally with reverence, blending scientific triumph with national pride. More than symbolism, however, the program advances strategic objectives: testing lunar landing technologies, developing autonomous rovers, and securing access to rare resources like helium-3, which could fuel future fusion reactors. China’s long-term vision includes a lunar research station by 2035, part of its broader goal to become a “space power” by 2030. Russia’s participation in the ILRS with China introduces a new axis of competition and collaboration. Moscow’s historical expertise in long-duration human spaceflight—pioneering Soyuz missions and Mir—gives it leverage, but economic constraints and geopolitical isolation limit its reach. The partnership with China reflects a

pragmatic alignment, yet also underscores how lunar ambitions are increasingly shaped by terrestrial alliances and rivalries. Meanwhile, India's Chandrayaan-3 success in 2023 marked a turning point for emerging space powers. By achieving a soft landing near the lunar south pole—home to water ice—India joined an elite group, signaling its ascent as a technological and economic player. New Delhi frames the mission as a step toward self-reliance, reducing dependence on foreign launch services and positioning India as a provider of lunar infrastructure. The geopolitical stakes extend beyond national pride. Lunar resources—particularly water ice, which can be split into hydrogen and oxygen for rocket fuel—could enable “refueling stations” in cislunar space, drastically reducing the cost of deep-space missions. The U.S. and its allies view such infrastructure as a public good, essential for sustainable exploration. But China's focus on resource extraction for domestic energy security raises concerns about monopolization. The Outer Space Treaty prohibits sovereignty claims, but it lacks enforcement mechanisms. As Dr. Thomas Zurbuchen, NASA's associate administrator for science, noted in a 2023 forum: “The Moon is not a frontier to conquer, but a domain to steward. Without shared governance, we risk repeating the colonial patterns that marred Earth's history.”

In Africa, lunar ambitions are often framed through development and equity. Nigeria's National Space Research and Development Agency (NASRDA) and Kenya's Space Agency (KSA) are investing in satellite technology, but lunar exploration remains aspirational. Yet leaders like Dr. Makama Mbow, a Senegalese space policy expert, argue that inclusion in lunar governance is urgent. ‘Africa has contributed little to space exploration historically, yet we stand to benefit most

from lunar-derived technologies—clean water, renewable energy, telecommunications,’ he asserts. The African Union’s Space Policy, though nascent, calls for a continental lunar framework, emphasizing capacity-building and shared benefit. Without such initiatives, lunar development risks deepening a new form of space inequality. The Moon’s symbolism also intersects with military strategy. While the Outer Space Treaty bans weapons of mass destruction on the Moon, it does not restrict kinetic or cyber capabilities targeting satellites or lunar infrastructure. The U.S. Space Force, established in 2019, now monitors space domain awareness, including lunar assets. China and Russia
