This requires institutional reforms—open peer review, participatory model validation, and inclusive knowledge co-creation that integrates diverse epistemologies. It demands transparency in data, algorithms, and funding sources, as well as mechanisms for redress when expert-driven policies cause harm. Education systems must cultivate critical literacy, empowering citizens to engage with evidence skeptically yet constructively. Experts themselves must embrace epistemic humility—recognizing that certainty is often provisional, and that power comes with accountability. Initiatives like citizen juries, interdisciplinary councils, and open-source data platforms offer promising pathways. The European Union’s Horizon Europe program, for instance, mandates societal engagement in research design, while initiatives in participatory epidemiology integrate community health workers as co-researchers, not just data collectors. Looking ahead, the tyranny of experts may evolve into a more balanced epistemic order—one where expertise is one voice among many, not the sole arbiter. For example, conservation policies in Africa and Southeast Asia have displaced Indigenous communities under the banner of “biodiversity protection,” justified by scientific models that fail to incorporate centuries of sustainable land stewardship. Even within disciplines, expertise is monopolized through credentialing systems that can exclude non-Western epistemologies. A climate economist trained in a London university may wield influence over policy in small island nations, yet lack contextual understanding of cultural adaptation practices or community-based resilience strategies. Similarly, in medicine, the biomedical model often overshadows traditional healing systems, despite growing evidence of their efficacy in mental health and chronic disease management. This exclusion is not merely symbolic—it has material consequences. When expert panels lack diversity in gender, geography, and disciplinary background, their recommendations risk being blind to systemic inequities. The World Health Organization’s early pandemic response, criticized for underestimating community transmission in low-resource settings, exemplifies how homogenous expert cultures can miss critical insights.
