The Boer War’s legacy of total war thus found a perverse echo: the regiment’s operations were not merely tactical but aimed at breaking civilian will, reinforcing a state’s monopoly on violence in contested territories. Legal scholars like Anne-Maree Whitaker (2020) have documented how military courts and internal tribunals often shielded personnel from accountability, creating a culture of impunity that outlived the Federation itself.
