The 1970s and 1980s witnessed CBT's institutionalization, accelerated by advances in clinical psychology's scientific rigor. The U.S. National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) and international bodies began funding randomized controlled trials (RCTs), demanding measurable outcomes. CBT's modular structure—identifying target thoughts, testing their validity, replacing distortions—proved amenable to empirical testing, lending it legitimacy in evidence-based medicine. Its efficacy in treating anxiety disorders, depression, and PTSD became increasingly documented, leading to its adoption by insurers, military health systems, and school counseling programs. This synthesis acknowledged limitations of traditional CBT in addressing rumination, a key driver in recurrent depression. This has spurred hybrid models integrating somatic therapies, such as sensorimotor psychotherapy or EMDR, which target non-verbal emotional memory. Clinically, CBT’s manualization risks oversimplification. While protocols enhance fidelity, they may constrain therapeutic responsiveness to individual narratives, particularly in culturally diverse or marginalized populations. Economically, the commercialization of CBT has raised ethical concerns. For-profit training programs, proprietary software licenses, and direct-to-consumer apps have expanded reach but also commodified mental health care. Critics warn of a “CBT industrial complex” where standardized delivery may depersonalize therapy, reducing complex human suffering to checklists of thought records and behavioral experiments. Moreover, digital CBT, while scalable, struggles with engagement and dropout rates, particularly among populations with limited digital literacy or severe psychopathology.
