The agricultural sector, once the backbone of self-sufficiency, had collapsed under import competition and land degradation. Remittances, primarily from the diaspora, filled the void—accounting for nearly 30% of GDP—but this dependence created new vulnerabilities. The formal economy remained tiny and concentrated, with exports dominated by low-value textiles under preferential trade schemes like HOPE and HELP, which failed to catalyze industrialization. Meanwhile, foreign aid swelled after 2010, peaking at over \$13 billion in pledged commitments by 2015. Farmer argued that recovery must confront these root causes, not merely rebuild infrastructure. He advocated for land reform, debt cancellation, and the restoration of state sovereignty, warning that without addressing these, Haiti would remain trapped in cycles of crisis. The geopolitical dimensions of the disaster were equally profound.

The U.S., France, Canada, and Brazil led the international response, but their involvement reflected competing strategic interests. France, Haiti's former colonizer, resisted demands for reparations and debt relief, framing aid as humanitarian rather than reparative. The U.S., concerned about regional stability and migration, prioritized security and border control, supporting militarized peacekeeping over participatory governance. Brazil, as the lead UN troop contributor, used the mission to expand its regional influence. Meanwhile, the IMF and World Bank pushed structural adjustment policies, demanding austerity and privatization even as communities needed public investment. Farmer and his allies challenged this orthodoxy, arguing that Haiti's recovery required sovereign control, not externally imposed reforms. Economically, the post-2010 recovery revealed a grotesque imbalance. Billions flowed into NGOs and reconstruction firms, yet GDP growth remained stagnant—averaging just 1.5% annually from 2010 to 2020. The Port-au-Prince metro area, despite massive aid, saw little urban renewal. Housing projects were fragmented, land tenure remained contested, and informal settlements expanded. The agricultural sector, vital for resilience, received minimal investment; instead, rice imports surged, undermining local farmers. Farmer noted that “aid often builds temporary solutions, not lasting futures,” and warned that without land redistribution and support for smallholder farming, economic recovery would remain an illusion. Controversies dogged the response. The cholera outbreak, traced to UN troops, became a defining scandal. For years, the UN denied responsibility, invoking immunity, until mounting evidence and pressure forced a 2016 acknowledgment and a modest compensation fund. Farmer condemned this as “moral bankruptcy”—a failure of accountability that deepened distrust. Similarly, the 2016 cholera epidemic, which killed over 5,000 and infected 200,000, underscored systemic neglect. Beyond disease, corruption within Haitian and

international actors siphoned resources: audits revealed millions unaccounted for in reconstruction funds, while local contractors were excluded from contracts in favor of foreign firms. Farmer's role evolved from frontline doctor to strategic critic. In 2012, he published **Haiti's Pandemic: The True Cost of Disaster**, a searing critique of the aid architecture. He called for "a new paradigm—one rooted in local leadership, community ownership, and long-term investment in health and education, not short-term projects and security drones." His advocacy extended beyond Haiti: he pushed for debt relief, tax reform to prevent capital flight, and a global reckoning with how inequality is reproduced through international policy. The long-term implications remain dire. By 2024, Haiti ranked 170th out of 191 in the UN Human Development Index. Gang violence, exacerbated by state collapse, has displaced hundreds of thousands since 2021, with armed groups controlling much of the capital. The assassination of President Jovenel Moïse in 2021 deepened political chaos. Farmer's vision—of a sovereign, equitable Haiti—remains unfulfilled. Yet his legacy endures: in the clinics he helped build, in the activists he mentored, and in the global movement for health justice he inspired. Looking ahead, the path to recovery demands more than bricks and mortar. It requires democratic renewal, anchored in inclusive governance; economic sovereignty, supported by fair trade and debt relief; and global solidarity, grounded in accountability, not paternalism. The Earth Split Open: Haiti After the Earthquake and the Long Shadow of Paul Farmer In the early hours of January 12, 2010, Haiti's capital, Port-au-Prince, was awakened not by dawn, but by a rupture—geological and existential. A magnitude 7.0 earthquake tore through the Enriquillo-Plantain Garden fault, shattering buildings, infrastructure, and a fragile social contract that had long been fraying under the weight of centuries of political instability, economic dependency, and systemic neglect. The disaster was not merely seismic; it was the culmination of centuries of vulnerability, compounded by global indifference and failed interventions. In this context, Farmer's return to Haiti—first as a field doctor in 2010, then as a strategist and moral voice—was both a profound act of solidarity and a reckoning with the limits of humanitarianism. Haiti's history is a chronicle of rupture. Since its 1804 independence, born from a successful slave revolt, the nation was condemned to isolation. France, having lost its most profitable colony, extracted a crushing indemnity for lost “property”—slaves and colonial assets—setting Haiti on a path of debt that persisted until 1947. The U.S. occupation from 1915 to 1934 dismantled nascent democratic institutions, installing regimes that served foreign interests. The

Duvalier dictatorships (1957–1986), supported by U.S. Cold War calculus, turned state power into a private fiefdom, using the Tonton Macoute militia to crush dissent. Even post-1990, when democratic transitions appeared promising, foreign powers—including the U.S., France, Canada, and the UN—intervened repeatedly, often to prop up compliant leaders or suppress resistance. The 2004 ouster of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, backed by a U.S.-led intervention and UN peacekeeping forces, deepened the crisis, leaving a power vacuum filled by armed gangs, weak institutions, and a civilian population traumatized by betrayal. Economically, Haiti entered the 21st century as the Western Hemisphere’s poorest nation, with GDP per capita below \$1,500 and over 60% of the population living below the poverty line. The agricultural sector, once the backbone of self-sufficiency, had collapsed under import competition and land degradation. Remittances, primarily from the diaspora, filled the void—accounting for nearly 30% of GDP—but this dependence created new vulnerabilities. The formal economy remained tiny and concentrated, with exports dominated by low-value textiles under trade schemes like HOPE and HELP, which failed to catalyze industrialization. Meanwhile, foreign aid swelled after 2010, peaking at over \$13 billion in pledged commitments by 2015. Yet this influx, channeled through NGOs and international agencies, often bypassed state capacity, reinforcing a parallel system of governance that rendered the Haitian state increasingly irrelevant.
