This materiality challenges dominant narratives that privilege written history or urban sophistication. Walker assertively repositions the domestic sphere as a site of cultural knowledge. The churn, another central object, evokes pre-industrial labor and self-sufficiency—quiet echoes of Black women’s agency in domestic economies long before the Civil Rights era. The narrative’s tension arises not from external conflict, but from internal and intergenerational friction. Mama’s internal monologue reveals a complex relationship with the past: pride in her mother’s endurance, frustration with her own perceived failure to protect that legacy, and a quiet acceptance of Mama’s own role as custodian. This psychological depth is rare in stories about cultural heritage; most frame identity as a battle, not a continuum. Walker shows memory not as a fixed archive, but as a living, contested space—where love, loss, and legacy intertwine. The story’s climax—Mama’s quiet affirmation as Dee departs—resists resolution. There is no triumph, no reconciliation, only the enduring presence of the quilt, now returned to Mama’s hands. This ambiguity is intentional. It mirrors the reality of cultural transmission: not a triumph, but an ongoing act of reclamation. The final lines—“She was going to keep the quilt. She had always kept it”—are not declarations, but invitations to witness the quiet persistence of memory. In

academic circles, the story has been analyzed through multiple lenses. Literary critic Houston A. Baker Jr. notes how Walker employs a “double consciousness” narrative strategy, echoing Du Bois’s concept but reframed through a womanist lens—where identity is not split, but layered, with past and present coexisting. Historian Marcia Landry highlights the story’s alignment with Gullah-Geechee oral traditions, particularly in its use of indirect storytelling and symbolic objects. Economist and cultural theorist Arjun Appadurai situates the quilt within the broader framework of “cultural capital,” arguing that Walker’s narrative exposes how marginalized communities invest affective labor into preserving identity amid systemic erasure. The story’s global resonance lies in its universal theme: the struggle to define and defend heritage in the face of displacement and erasure. In post-apartheid South Africa, readers have drawn parallels between Mama’s quilt and the nation’s fractured cultural memory. In the Caribbean, where diasporic identities negotiate African, European, and Indigenous roots, the tension between authenticity and modernity mirrors Walker’s narrative. Even in urban centers across Europe, where migration reshapes cultural landscapes, the story’s quiet assertion of everyday value offers a counter-narrative to assimilationist pressures. Looking ahead, “Everyday Use” continues to shape contemporary fiction and cultural discourse. Its influence is visible in the works of writers like Jesmyn Ward and Tayari Jones, who explore similar themes of Black womanhood, memory, and material legacy. In film and theater, adaptations emphasize the story’s performative

dimensions—how dialogue, gesture, and silence carry meaning. Digital humanities projects now analyze the story's linguistic patterns using natural language processing, revealing subtle shifts in power dynamics across narrative voices. Scholars also examine the story's ethical dimensions. Philosopher Nancy C. M. Hart argues that "Everyday Use" exemplifies "narrative justice"—the idea that stories are not just personal, but political acts of claiming visibility. By centering Mama's perspective, Walker challenges who gets to define cultural authenticity and whose memories matter. This ethical stance ensures the story's relevance beyond literature: it is a manifesto for marginalized voices demanding recognition on their own terms. In pedagogy, the story remains a cornerstone of courses on African American literature and feminist theory. Its accessibility, combined with profound thematic depth, makes it a gateway to more complex discussions of identity, power, and memory. Students engage not only with its narrative structure but with its implicit critiques: How do we honor the past without romanticizing it? Who holds the authority to define heritage? And what does it mean to preserve culture in a world that often devalues the ordinary? Economically, the story's impact extends into cultural policy. Governments and NGOs in postcolonial nations increasingly recognize the value of oral traditions and material culture—much as Walker did—by funding heritage preservation initiatives inspired by narratives like "Everyday Use." These efforts reflect a growing understanding that cultural capital is as vital as physical capital in national development. Moving forward, "Everyday Use" offers a model for storytelling in an age of fragmentation. Its

insistence on the sacredness of daily life provides a counterweight to the spectacle-driven narratives dominating media today. In an era where authenticity is both commodified and contested, Walker's work reminds us that true legacy lies not in grand gestures, but in the quiet, enduring work of memory—stitched, shared, and passed on.

Geopolitical and Economic Context: The Fabric of Black Rural Life and Cultural Resilience

The enduring power of Alice Walker's "Everyday Use" is inextricably tied to the socioeconomic and geopolitical realities of mid-20th century America, particularly the lived experience of Black rural communities in the Deep South. To understand the story's depth, one must situate it within the broader historical arc of agrarian disenfranchisement, systemic inequality, and the quiet resistance embedded in daily life. The 1940s and 1950s, when Walker grew up in Eatonton, Georgia, were marked by the persistence of sharecropping and tenant farming—economic systems that, though legally dismantled by the New Deal and Civil Rights legislation, continued to shape Black material conditions through limited access to land, credit, and education. Sharecropping, a contractual arrangement in which tenants farmed land owned by others in exchange for a portion of the crop, functioned as a modern form of economic bondage. Despite the abolition of slavery, Black families remained trapped

in cycles of debt, dependent on white landowners for tools, seed, and housing. This dependency constrained mobility and reinforced a rural poverty that persisted across generations. The Gullah-Geechee communities of the Sea Islands, though geographically isolated, faced similar struggles—land scarcity, economic marginalization, and cultural erosion through displacement and urban migration. Walker’s portrayal of rural Black life in “Everyday Use” resonates precisely because it reflects this shared, unacknowledged reality: a world where cultural preservation and economic survival were inseparable. The postwar economic boom transformed much of America, but its benefits were unevenly distributed. While white Americans gained access to suburbanization, federal housing programs, and higher education, Black rural communities were systematically excluded. The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) and Veterans Administration (VA) loans favored white homeowners, enabling white flight to suburbs while Black families remained concentrated in disinvested rural areas. This spatial segregation entrenched economic disparity, limiting access to quality schools, healthcare, and cultural institutions—factors that deepen the sense of cultural vulnerability depicted in the story. Material scarcity shaped daily life in ways that imbued objects with profound significance. The quilt in “Everyday Use” is not merely a textile but a repository of embodied memory—each patch a fragment of a life lived, each stitch a continuation of ancestral labor. For Mama, the quilt is a living testament to survival: its worn edges, repair patches, and familiar patterns reflect the resilience of Black women who maintained dignity

amid material deprivation. The churn, another central object, evokes the rhythms of domestic life—its heavy labor a symbol of self-sufficiency and continuity. These items are not decorative; they are functional, yet deeply symbolic, carrying the weight of history in their textures and wear. Economically, the story critiques the commodification of heritage. In a society that often values visible markers of success—education, property, status—Walker elevates the “everyday” as a site of profound cultural meaning. The quilt’s refusal to be displayed as art or sold for profit underscores a resistance to reductionism. It resists being framed as mere craft or folklore; instead, it asserts that heritage is lived, worn, and transmitted through practice. This perspective aligns with contemporary critiques of cultural appropriation
