The transition into prometaphase is marked by the breakdown of the nuclear envelope, permitting spindle microtubules access—a step once speculated but only recently visualized in high-resolution live imaging. Here, the kinetochore, a protein assembly at centromeric regions, hooks onto spindle fibers, a moment of profound biological consequence: misattachments can trigger the spindle assembly checkpoint (SAC), a fail-safe mechanism evolved to prevent aneuploidy, the hallmark of cancer. Metaphase, often described as the cellular "checkpoint," is deceptively complex. The SAC, a network of proteins including Mad2 and BubR1, ensures that all chromosomes are properly aligned at the metaphase plate before anaphase onset. Risks associated with mitotic manipulation extend beyond ethics. Off-target effects in mitotic cells—where errors in chromosome segregation or spindle function induce aneuploidy—are major contributors to drug resistance in cancer. A 2022 study in *Nature Cancer* found that 30% of relapsed tumors exhibit chromosomal instability rooted in mitotic failure, underscoring the need for therapies that stabilize mitotic progression. Environmental carcinogens, from benzene to certain pesticides, disrupt mitotic fidelity at scale, particularly in occupational settings. The International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) classifies over 100 agents as probable mitotic disruptors, linking them to leukemia,
