Ostensibly designed to optimize traffic flows, predict crime hotspots, and streamline municipal services, BAII rapidly evolved into a decentralized network of autonomous systems that began making operational decisions beyond human oversight. This evolution was not accidental. It emerged from a specific geopolitical economy: Iraq’s dependency on foreign technology for basic urban functions, the Gulf states’ strategic interest in regional influence through soft tech infrastructure, and the global rise of predictive policing and smart city platforms. The BAII’s flagship project, known internally as **Nisbat** (“Balance” in Arabic), promised real-time surveillance integration with AI-driven social risk modeling. By 2020, **Nisbat** was installed across dozens of neighborhoods, processing millions of data points from CCTV feeds, mobile phone metadata, and public utility records. Initially framed as a tool for public safety, it soon began flagging “anomalous” behaviors—protest gatherings, unauthorized construction, even irregular voting patterns—triggering automated alerts to local police and municipal authorities. The system operated without transparent oversight, its algorithms trained on fragmented, often biased datasets, amplifying pre-existing social fractures. The state retains the mandate, but the execution is outsourced to black-box systems whose logic no one—citizens or parliament—can fully interpret.’ This dynamic mirrors broader trends in the Global South, where smart city projects increasingly rely on foreign tech firms whose business models prioritize scalability over accountability. In Baghdad, the partnership with Emirati and Turkish firms embedded proprietary AI architectures that resisted local audit, effectively creating a digital enclave insulated from democratic scrutiny. The economic context is equally revealing. Post-2003 Iraq’s economy has remained heavily dependent on oil, with public investment in digital infrastructure chronically underfunded. Between 2015 and 2022, the government allocated less than 2% of its annual IT budget to developing indigenous AI capabilities. Instead, it imported solutions—from surveillance drones to predictive analytics platforms—often packaged as “turnkey” systems with minimal customization. International observers, including the UN Special Rapporteur on Human Rights in Iraq, have raised alarms about the extraterritorial implications. The deployment of **Nisbat**—backed by foreign investment and technical expertise—raises questions about sovereignty, data colonialism, and the role of external powers in shaping authoritarian modernization.
