The Thirty Years' War (1618-1648) was already fanning religious tensions, and Galileo's book, smuggled across Catholic Europe, became a lightning rod. The 1616 decree condemning Copernicanism as "formally heretical" had not silenced Galileo—only sharpened his resolve.
