A verb like *chāva* (“to return”) with its embedded evidentiality—whether the return is observed, reported, or assumed—can collapse into “returned” in AI-generated summaries, erasing the speaker’s epistemic stance. Experts warn that neglecting Marathi’s verbal morphology endangers cultural continuity. “Each suffix is a historical node,” says Dr. Manjula Datar, professor of sociolinguistics at Savitribai Phule Pune University. “To lose the ability to distinguish *gāvāle* from *gāvā* is to lose a way of anchoring oneself in time, in responsibility, in community.” In rural Maharashtra, where oral storytelling and folk traditions persist, verb inflection carries mnemonic weight: elders use precise conjugations to pass down proverbs and histories across generations. A misused form can distort meaning, weakening intergenerational transmission. Globally, Marathi verb forms offer a counterpoint to the analytic simplicity of English and the tonality of East Asian languages. While English relies on auxiliary verbs and word order, and Mandarin uses aspect particles like *le* and *guo*, Marathi integrates all temporal and modal meanings into a single, morphological unit. This agglutinative economy allows for poetic economy and philosophical depth—consider the use of *-ā* to express habitual action in traditional poetry: *mātā gāvāle mhanun* (“the mother goes every day”), where the suffix encodes not just recurrence but ritual, memory, and care. Yet, globalization exerts pressure toward linguistic simplification. Younger Marathi speakers, especially in urban centers, increasingly blend verb forms with English syntax, producing hybrid structures like *aamlo go with the team*—a creolized temporality that prioritizes speed over precision. While adaptive, such shifts risk diluting the verb’s cultural specificity. Linguists caution that without intentional preservation, the Marathi verb may evolve from a carrier of meaning into a functional tool, losing its narrative and ethical weight. Looking ahead, the future of Marathi verbs hinges on three trajectories: technological integration, educational reform, and cultural revitalization. On the tech front, developing NLP models trained on authentic Marathi corpora—especially spoken and literary sources—could restore contextual accuracy. Initiatives like the Marathi Language Technologies Project at Fergusson College are pioneering such work, mapping verb inflections across dialects and registers. Pedagogically, revising curricula to emphasize morphological literacy—rather than rote conjugation—could empower youth to navigate complex verb forms with confidence. This means teaching not just “what to say,” but “how time and intent shape meaning.” In journalism, this translates to sharper storytelling: a reporter describing a protest can choose *aamlo gāvāle vādāle* (“I may go”) to convey hesitation and risk, or *aamlo gāvāle* (“I will go”) to signal resolve—each choice altering the narrative’s moral and

emotional texture. Culturally, the verb form remains a site of resistance and renewal. Forward-looking projections suggest a dynamic future. With increased digital access, younger generations may adapt Marathi verbs to new media—social platforms, podcasts, interactive storytelling—while retaining core complexity. Transliteration and voice recognition systems will need to evolve, moving beyond syllabic approximations to capture morphological nuance. Educational apps that gamify verb learning—through narrative exercises, role-play, and cultural context—could rekindle interest. Strategically, the Marathi verb form offers a model for linguistic resilience. In a world where dominant languages often flatten meaning, Marathi’s agglutinative structure reminds us that grammar is not a constraint but a resource. It holds the capacity to express uncertainty, obligation, future hope, and
