By the High Middle Ages, Tenebrae had evolved into a formalized night service, typically held on Holy Week, especially Maundy Thursday or Good Friday evenings. Its liturgical structure, though never universally mandated, became a hallmark of Benedictine and Cistercian houses, spreading
