Traditional storytelling treats a story as a completed artifact, shaped by authorial intent and shaped by audience reception. The result is a flood of content that feels authentic yet is systematically produced—a paradox of human-like output generated by non-human systems.

Yet this scalability comes with trade-offs. The emphasis on engagement metrics often favors emotionally charged, simplified narratives over nuanced, complex ones. Stories that conform to prompt logic—clear heroes, clear villains, clear resolutions—tend to perform better, creating a feedback loop that reinforces narrative homogenization. Deeper, more ambiguous stories risk being filtered out as “low-performing.” This dynamic threatens the diversity of human expression, reducing narrative complexity to a set of predictable variables optimized for algorithmic approval.

The export of these frameworks raises critical questions about narrative sovereignty. As digital platforms enable cross-border dissemination of prompt-based content, local media ecosystems face pressure to conform to globally dominant narrative templates. This can marginalize indigenous storytelling traditions, reducing cultural diversity to a set of universally marketable arcs.
