Equally critical is the informal and gig economy, which remains underreported in official claims. Many workers—rideshare drivers, delivery couriers, freelance tech contractors—fall through administrative cracks. Ohio's unemployment system, built for standard W-2 employment, struggles to capture this fluid labor. A 2022 Brookings Institution study estimated 36% of Ohio's service-sector workers are "missed" by current reporting systems, with claims data understating true labor market stress.
