This dynamic creates a bifurcated ecosystem: Western indies struggle to compete with Chinese-backed behemoths that benefit from vast domestic user bases and integrated monetization infrastructures. Platform algorithms, often opaque, further entrench this asymmetry—favoring content that drives high session frequency and conversion, regardless of creative merit. The result is a global market where "free" games reflect not just consumer choice, but structural dependencies on Chinese industrial capacity and capital.
