These ships transport oil, metals, and military equipment, often routed through third-party states to obscure origin. Insurance markets reflect this tension. Lloyd's of London, a cornerstone of global trade, now faces rising claims from dark voyages, particularly in high-risk zones. The Financial Action Task Force has repeatedly flagged crypto exchanges as high-risk vectors for money laundering, estimating that 1.7% of global crypto transactions involve illicit funds—equivalent to billions of dollars annually.
